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THE MOUNT GAY ROUND BARBADOS RACE TRADITION

The earliest recorded sailing race around Barbados was held on New Year's Day 1936. Five trading Schooners took part going Southabout (anticlockwise) starting at 7am. The race was won handsomely by the American Schooner "Sea Fox" captained by Lou Kennedy a distant relative of the Kennedy family and a renowned smuggler. His winning time to complete the 60-mile circumnavigation was 10 hours and 22 minutes. The prize was ten pounds sterling but the real prize was the bragging rights. The Islanders loved the race and there was traffic chaos as people drove across the island to get a view and thousands more were amazed by the latest technology of the day providing live radio broadcasts.

Cut ahead 75 years. The Barbados Cruising Club in Association with Mount Gay Rum decided to revive the tradition with an annual sailing race around the island. The date of the race was set as 21st January, the birthday of one of the founding figures of the Barbados Cruising Club The Rt Excellent Errol Walton Barrow. Errol Barrow was also the first Prime Minister of Independent Barbados and is revered as a National Hero. His birthday is celebrated with a national holiday and it seemed a fitting tribute to the man who used to love to sit on the terrace of the Barbados Cruising Club to hold the Mount Gay Rum Round Barbados Race on Errol Barrow Day. As with the first race, thousands of people come out to watch from the beaches and the latest technology is employed to help people follow the race; each participating boat is equipped with a GPS tracker and people around the world can follow the race on their computers and smart phones. There is only one race mark, which is the start-finish line between the committee boat and the flagpole on the Barbados Cruising Club. Boats are started in a staggered fashion with the aim of getting everyone safely back to the Club for a massive party with plenty of Mount Gay Rum in the late afternoon.

There are several prizes available but the most coveted is the prize for breaking a record time around the island. The prize on offer is the Skipper's weight in Mount Gay Rum Extra Old. Each skipper is carefully weighed before the start of the race. The record times are a bit quicker than they were for the schooners of the 1930s and the absolute record currently stands at 4 hours, 24 minutes, 27 seconds for a multihull and 4 hours 42 minutes and 20 seconds, for a monohull.

Even if you don't win a prize you have a good chance of getting your money back in Mount Gay Rum when you get ashore. You will also be awarded one of the highly sought after Mount Gay Red Caps. The race series now includes 8 parties all fuelled by copious quantities of Mount Gay Rum. Whether you are racing or watching from the shore enjoy the 2015 Mount Gay Round Barbados Race.

THE MOUNT GAY ROUND BARBADOS RACE SERIES

January 17th-24th 2015 - SAILING INSTRUCTIONS: All Races

1. RULES GOVERNING THE RACE

The race will be governed by the rules as defined in the current Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) published by ISAF

RESPONSIBILTY Fundamental rule 4; The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone. Competitors participate in the Regatta entirely at their own risk. The organising of the authority will not accept liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during or after the Regatta.

2. OFFICIAL NOTICE BOARD

The notice board is located beach side of the Barbados Cruising Club. Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted on the official notice board by 8pm on the day before each race.

3. RADIO MONITORING

The race committee will monitor channel 11 on race days. An effort will be made to broadcast on channel 11 any boats prematurely starting.

4. BOATS RETIRING FROM THE RACE

A boat that retires from a race for any reason MUST notify the race committee on channel 11 or the Safety Officer via phone on +1 246 248 1986. Official race results will not be posted until all boats are accounted for.

5. PROTESTS

To conform with RRS 61.1a. Any yacht intending to protest must hoist a red flag as soon as possible after the incident and keep it hoisted and clearly visible until finishing, and hail the yacht concerned immediately to inform of their intention to protest. Protests must be made in writing and handed to the committee desk located at the Barbados Cruising Club not later than 1 hour after the finishing time of the protestor. Protests will be heard ASAP after filing. Directions to the Protest Room will be placed on the BCC Notice Board.

For Breaches of the RRS other than for Part 2, the Protest Committee may impose an alternative Penalty that it deems fair and appropriate.

6. CREW

It is the responsibility of the Skipper to provide signed yacht crew lists. Any failure to provide signed crew documentation to race committee may be penalized.

THE MOUNT GAY ROUND BARBADOS RACE SERIES

January 17th-19th 2015 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS: Coastal Races

1. ANCHORS

Shall not be carried over the bow or stern whilst racing coastal races.

2. START LINE

Carlisle Bay between the Mount Gay Rum flag on committee boat and the <u>yellow</u> <u>marks</u> as shown on the course diagram.

3. FINISH LINE

Carlisle Bay between the Mount Gay Rum flag on committee boat and the <u>yellow</u> marks as shown on the course diagram.

4. DESCRIPTION OF MARKS

Apart from Start and Finish Marks, all marks will be orange Mount Gay Rum tetrahedrons.

5. CLASSES

Racing Class	(CSA Rating)	Green Flag
Cruising A	(CSA Rating)	White Flag
Non CSA Rated	(Local Rating)	Yellow Flag
Multihull	(Local Rating)	Pink Flag
J/24 Class	(One Design)	Blue Flag

6. TIME LIMIT

Boats other than J/24 class, must complete racing by the time limit of 4:00 pm.

J/24 class boats must complete racing within 20 minutes of the first J/24 class boat completing the course. Boats not finishing within the time limit shall be scored "TLE" without hearing. A TLE score shall be one more point than the number of boats that finished and received a finishing position in their class.

7. SCORING

Each boat's series score shall be the total of her race scores, except for the J/24 class where the worst score may be discarded when 4 or more races have been completed.

THE MOUNT GAY RUM ROUND BARBADOS RACE

January 21st 2015 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. START LINE

Carlisle Bay between the Mount Gay Rum flag on committee boat (and any trailing dinghies/marks attached to the stern thereof) and the Flag Pole located at the Barbados Cruising Club.

2. FINISH LINE

Carlisle Bay between the Mount Gay Rum flag on committee boat (any trailing dinghies/marks attached to the stern thereof)

3. STARTING PROCEDURES AND TIMES

The Barbados Cruising Club Burgee will be raised on the committee boat 5 minutes before the first start and lowered at the last start. All starts will be assisted by VHF announcements.

A. PREMATURE STARTS

Premature starters who start within 1 minute of their start will be assessed a 10 minute penalty. Any boat starting MORE than 1 minute before their start time will be scored DSQ.

B. LATE STARTS

Any late starter must keep clear of all yachts starting in their sequence

Starting times will be posted on the official notice board by 4pm January 20th. Starting times have been calculated to allow for all boats to reach the finish line between 3:30pm -5:00pm.

4. COURSE

Around Barbados "north about" in a clockwise direction returning to the same start finish line. Approximately 60 miles. Yachts are requested to call the committee boat on channel 11 approximately 1 mile from the finish.

5. TIME LIMIT

8

6pm January 21st 2015.

THE BARBADOS TO ANTIGUA OCEAN PASSAGE RACE

January 24th 2015 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. SKIPPER'S BRIEFING

A separate skipper's briefing will be held for participants of the Ocean Passage Race to Antigua at the Radisson Aquatica Resort (situated beside the Barbados Cruising Club) at 6pm on 23rd January 2015.

2. START LINE

Carlisle Bay between the Flag Pole located at the Barbados Cruising Club (BCC) and a Mount Gay Rum tetrahedral mark placed approximately 1km from the BCC.

3. STARTING PROCEDURES AND TIMES

To be announced at the Skipper's briefing on 23rd January 2013.

A. PREMATURE STARTS

Every effort will be made to contact premature starters on channel 11. Premature starters will be assessed a 10 minute penalty.

4. COURSE

All islands south of Les Desirade are to be left to port. The finish will be between Fort Charlotte at the Eastern entrance of English Harbour and a buoy to its South. Course length is approximately 265 miles. All yachts are requested to call the race committee on channel 6, 2 miles before the finish.

5. BOATS RETIRING FROM THE RACE

A boat that retires from the race for any reason MUST notify the race committee on channel 11 (Barbados) or channel 6 (Antigua) or the Barbados Cruising Club Safety Officer or Antigua Super Yacht Challenge on +1 246 248 1986

6. PROTESTS

Protests must be made in writing and handed to the committee desk located at the Antigua Yacht Club not later than 2 hours after the finishing time of the protestor.



















CHAMBERLAIN BRIDGE FOR INNER BASIN LIFT TIMES



ALL ABOUT THE BARBADOS CRUISING CLUB



The Barbados Cruising Club was founded by Ian Gale, of The Barbados Advocate in October 1957 in response to restrictive membership practices then in place at the neighbouring Barbados Yacht Club. Founding members included the who's who of Bajan society, most notably the Right Excellent Errol Walton Barrow, who after completing his term as the first club treasurer, went on to lead Barbados to independence from Britain in 1966, becoming the Island's first Prime Minister.

With Barbados' beautiful beaches, crystal blue waters, and perfect sailing conditions, it is the Club's mission to make sailing available to ordinary Barbadians. This is as important to us now as it was back then in 1957.

After many years as a vibrant social and sailing club, the Barbados Cruising Club fell into decline following the turn of the century. By 2006 the Club was effectively bankrupt, with large debts and few members. But those members never gave up and their persistence and determination paid off. A steering committee was created to guide the club back to life. Through their hard work, and partnerships with local businesses the Cruising Club was given a new lease of life.

The Club today is almost unrecognisable from the Cruising Club of 2006. Major renovations started in 2009, and continued through 2010. Our membership numbers grow month on month. The Cruising Club is now proudly back in its place as a vibrant South Coast hub, with regular sailing and social events.

Although our decor has changed and our facilities improved, the core values and aims of the Club have not. We are a totally inclusive club that welcomes members both locally and internationally. We strive to share the 'sailing bug' throughout Barbados. We recognise the special place that Errol Barrow holds in our history through the name of the bar, "Dipper's", his nickname, and also by hosting The Mount Gay Rum Round Barbados Race on Errol Barrow Day, January 21st annually.
